ADMINISTRATION

Everyday responsibilities that must be met by these people include, for Dr. Paul McAreavey, our Superintendent, supervising a staff of 70 people, making the effort to maintain the facilities provided, looking for up-to-date program areas, which this year included the installation of computers and electronic typewriters. As Superintendent of a school district one must also be attentive of the state legislature which, by revenue, has a significant impact on our school district. Dr. McAreavey also sees that the policies and practices that the Board of Education have set up are carried out. Dr. McAreavey said he likes his job because "it always involves working with both adults and students."

Mr. Rasmussen, our High School Principal, has the job of scheduling all of the school activities, assisting with the setting up and adjusting of class schedules, conferring with consultants and administrators from other schools about curriculum and the daily needs of high school students. He takes care of disciplinary problems and talks with parents concerning students. Mr. Rasmussen commented that the main purpose of his job is "trying to provide for all the students the type of education that we would each want for our own children."

Mr. Brende, our Guidance Counselor, handles guidance at all levels of the school. He regulates class scheduling and course changes. He makes sure students receive information about opportunities after graduation, which include meeting deadlines for ACT tests and financial aid opportunities. Individual counseling with students and teachers, teaching 7th grade Social Studies and World Geography are Mr. Brende's other responsibilities. He also coaches all Jr. and Sr. High volleyball teams. Mr. Brende said he wished that he had more time for his job and that students would be more motivated to sign up for opportunities that will affect their lives after graduation. He said he most liked his work with students who really go after the things that will make their life fulfilling.

Mr. Long, our Elementary Principal's duties are: making sure the curriculum is followed, assisting in Special Education, observing 27 teachers, reporting on functions of the classroom, teaching 7th and 8th grade Typing for $\frac{1}{3}$ of a semester, having bus duty after school, setting up kindergarten round-up, organizing Modern Woodman Speeches and Junior High Mini-Courses. Mr. Long stated that he liked "having the opportunity to work directly with adults and students." He also said that he enjoyed seeing the progress of students developing into responsible young men and women.

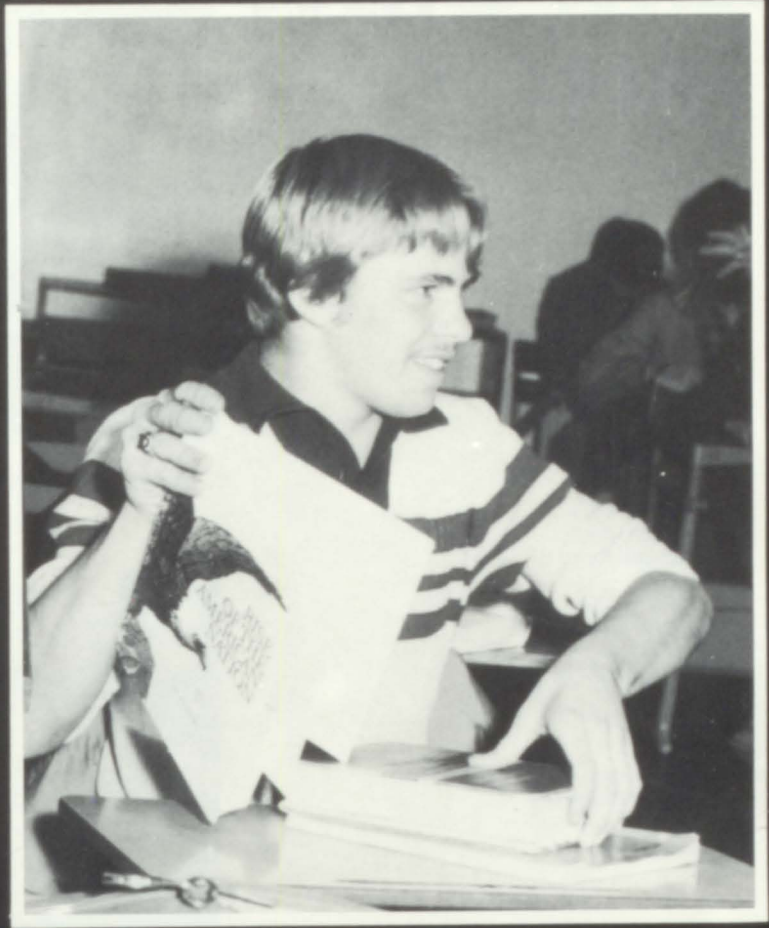

Playing games isn't the only use for computers, or at least that's what the students in high school have found out this year. Computer I is the new class craze around EPHS. The number of students in Computer I is limited to 18 per class. The school has only purchased 6 computers to date but is in hopes of purchasing more to give more students the opportunity to take this class.

The concepts taught in Computer I are basic programming language, and writing programs for practical occupations.

TEENS TAKE TRADE

The Vocational Education Program offered to EPHS students is a cooperative voc-ed program set up with the Vermillion school system. After the available slots have been filled by interested Vermillion students the remaining slots are offered to EPHS students. Seniors and Juniors are the only Elk Point students allowed to apply for this program.

The students are bussed to Vermillion everyday, leaving at approximately 8:15 and returning around noon. This set-up allows the students to come back for their required subjects during the last three periods of our schedule here at EPHS.

The courses that are made available to our students are Building and Trades, Cooks training, Auto mechanics and Welding. Approximately 10-12 students from our school participate in this program yearly. The participants have found the Vocational program a very interesting and beneficial portion of their total Educational experiences.

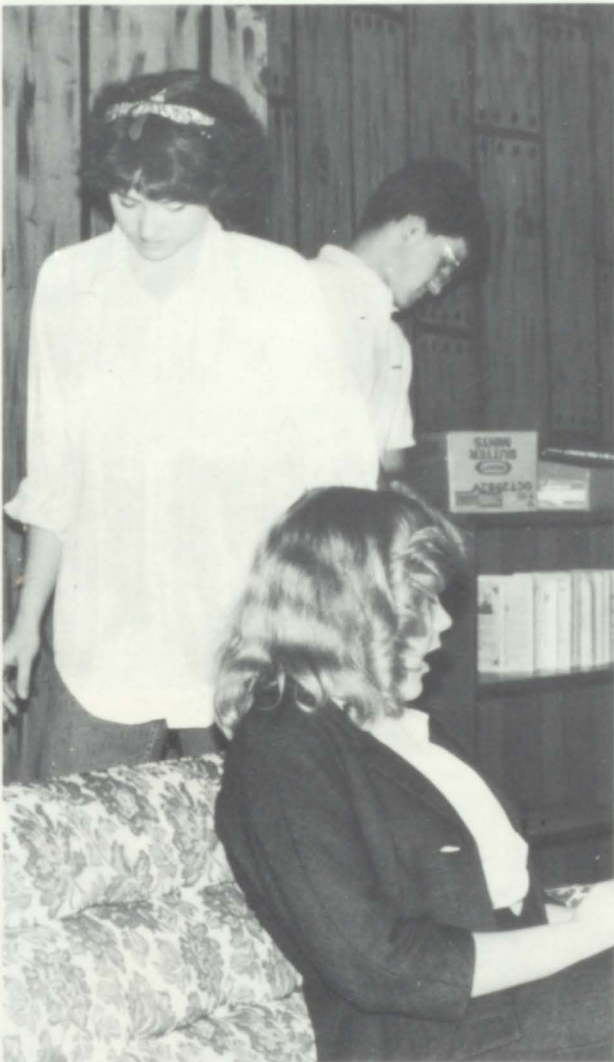

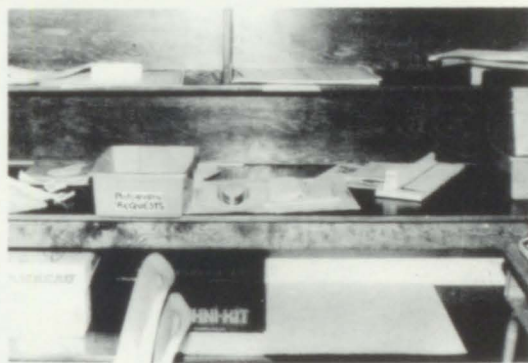

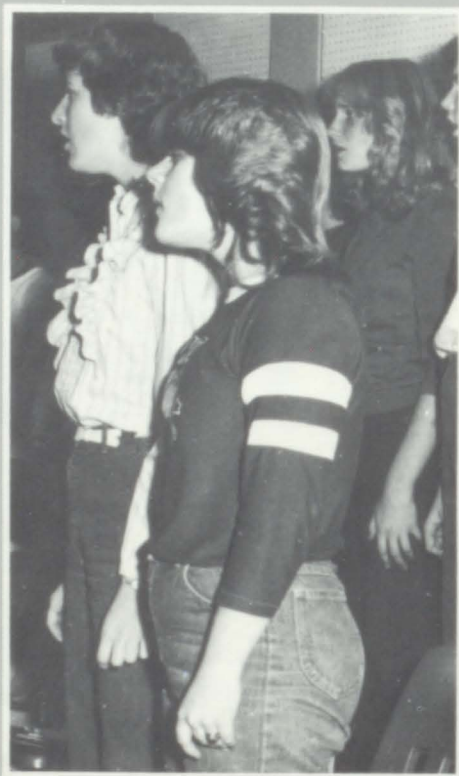

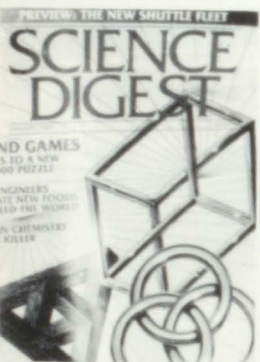

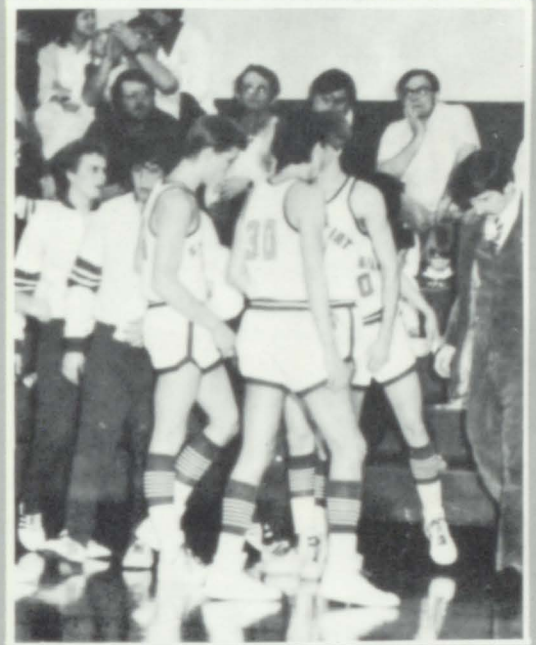

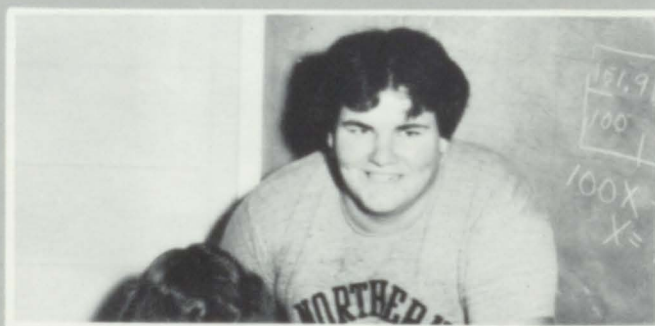

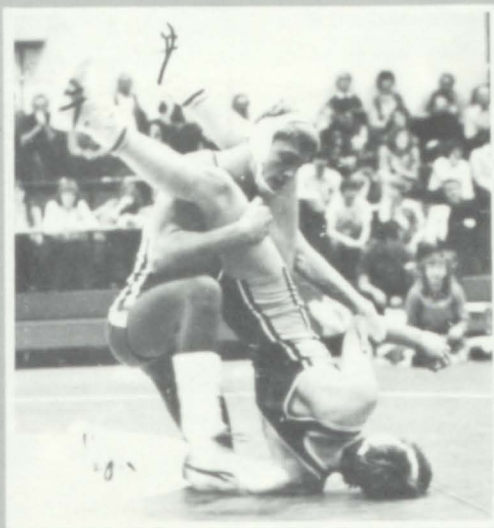

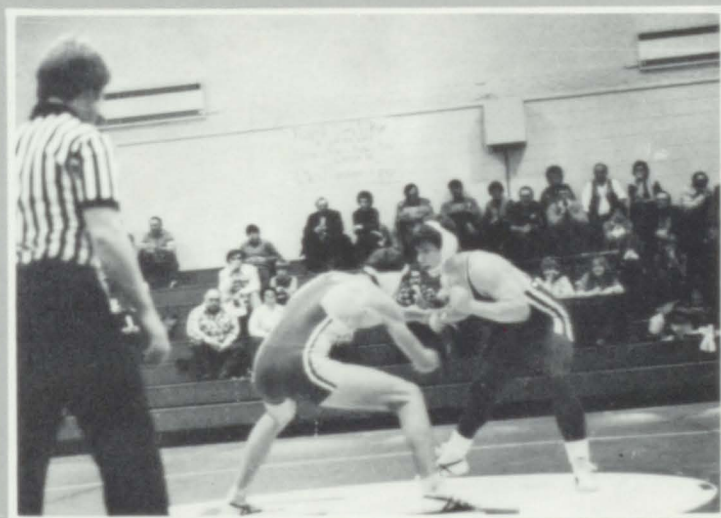

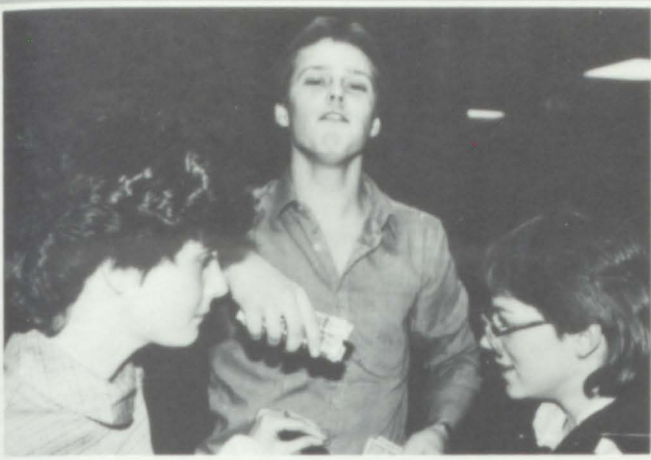

A dance on Saturday night closed up the Homecoming '82 festivities.



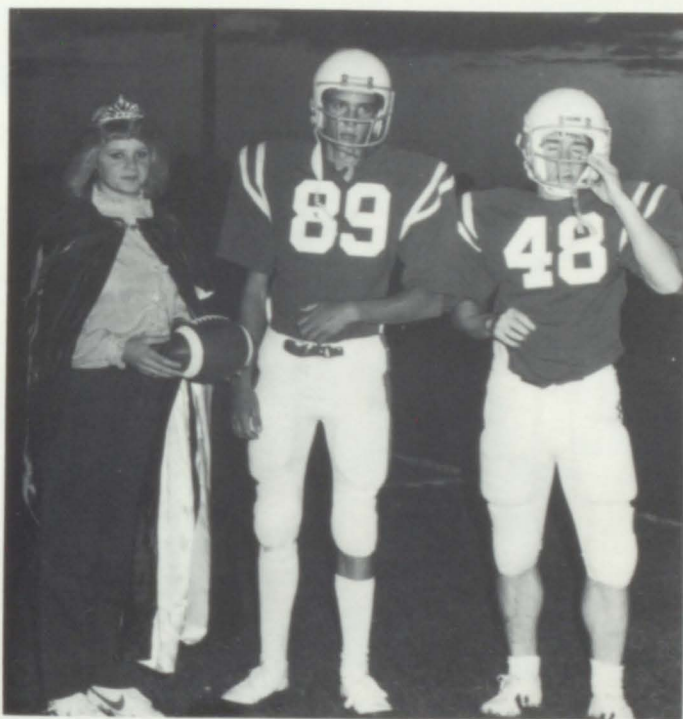

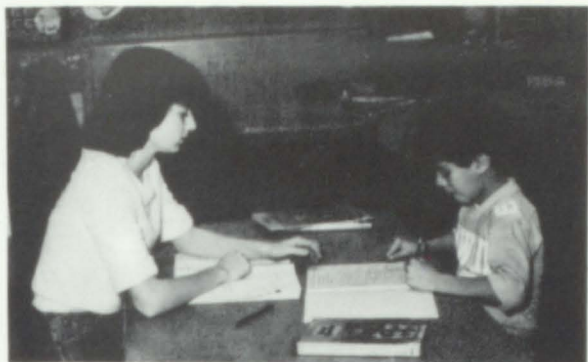
