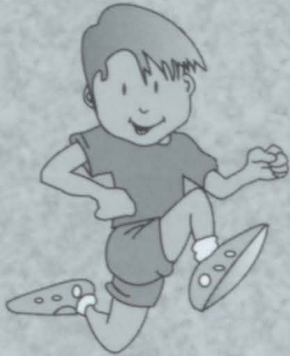

This year's Cross Country may have been small, but both boys and girls got the job done. The girls' team consisted of Jessica Hudelson, Allison Lawler, Haley Bosse, and Bobby McLaury. The boys' team consisted of Nick Bottger and Bryce Hernandez. Although the teams may have been small, they still did not give up. At each meet, they prevailed. With the girls' place of Second at the Big Sioux Conference Tourney and a Fourth place finish at Regions, the girls proved that even though this year's turnout was not all that big, that did not matter. With a state representative, Bobby McLaury placed 68th, with a time of 17 minutes and 54.5 seconds. Jessica's best time was at the Union County Quad with a time of 17 minutes and 20 seconds. Allison's best time was also at the Union County Quad with a time of 16 minutes and 46 seconds. Haley's best time happened at Canton with a time of 13 minutes and 52 seconds, and Bobby's best time also happened at Canton, with a time of 13 minutes and 15 seconds.



The boys' did not have enough members for a full team, but both boys did their best competing individually. Nick pulled a fifth place finish at the Vermillion meet, with a time 16 minutes and 44 seconds, and Bryce also finished a best place of 18th at Vermillion, with a time of 20 minutes and 33 seconds. Nick's best time was at Beresford, with a time of 12 minutes and 24.5 seconds. Bryce's best time was also at Beresford with a time of 16 minutes and 37.5 seconds.

This year turned out to be a great year for the Cross Country members. With a small team, they all showed that the Huskies were a force to be reckoned with.

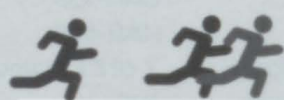

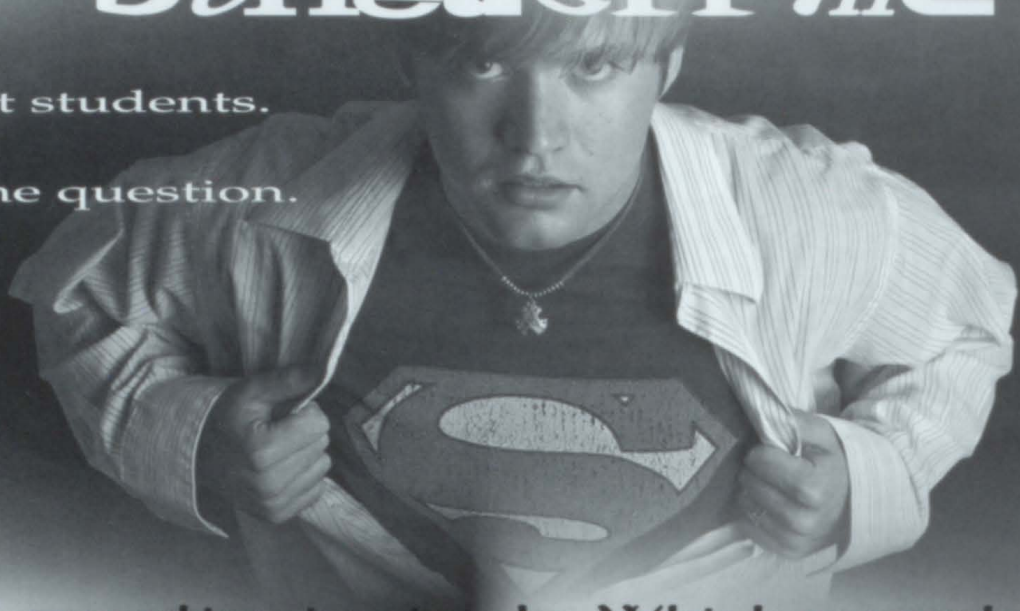

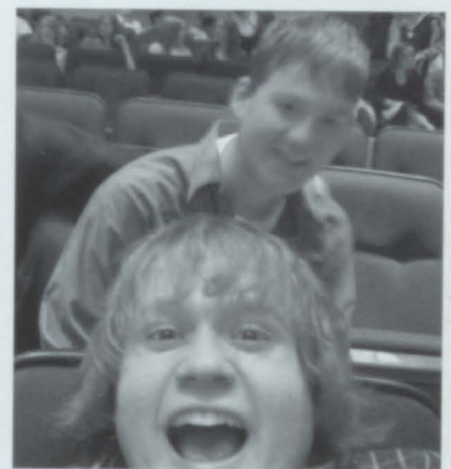




Hitting the High Notes

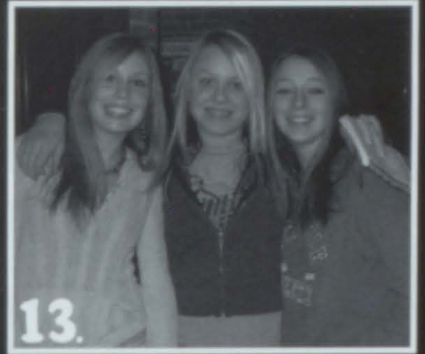
