

attended All Star Volleyball Camp at Brigham Young University in Hawaii June 23-July 2. She was one of the top placers in the individual jump-serve contest.




Derek Pirner





The Elk Point- Jefferson volleyball team opened up their season on a good note with a victory over Gayville-Volin. The Huskies continued to win their next three matches against Dakota Valley, Canton, and Harrisburg. They took third place in the Clark Tournament, but lost their next five matches to Beresford, Alcester- Hudson, West Central, Bon Homme, and Sioux Falls Christian. 






























Time for Good-bye












