On registration day, September l, twenty-three pupils enrolled in grades. The students were as follows: George Hacker, Shirley Bobzin, Louise Bruneau, Peter Dahm, Stanley Wilke, Donald Chicoine, Shirley Allen, Gary Winters, Harry Beacom, Nicholas Pomerico, Joann Hummel, Nancy Winters, Larry Allen, Mary Simons, Carl Kittler, Charlene Allen, Dennis King, Gary Tiernan, Marvin Britton, Charles Britton, Thomas Burns, Barbara Martin and Bobby Iesline. During October, Martha and Carolyn Tilson enrolled and on December first, Loretta and Gerald Lute enrolled. Dennis King, the Britton Boys, Shirley Bobzin and Barbara Martin moved away before the second semester.

We especially stressed safety rules and practice during the first semester. We adopted the motto "It is Smart to be Safe." Posters were made stressing this subject and written work in grammar completed the unit. During the first two weeks of school pupils of the first and second grades were taken across the railroad tracks and highway on their way home from school. Ordinary and special dangers were drawn to their attention each day.

The average daily attendance for this year was $92 \%$. George Hacker, Nancy Winters, and Stanley Wilke, have perfect attendance records. Don Chicoine and Gary Winters were absent one day during both semesters.

The following boys and girls who were on the honor roll during the year: Harry Beacom, Shirley Allen, Nicholas Pomerico, Joann Hummel, George Hacker, Martha Tilson, Gary Tiernan, Thomas Burns and Loretta Lute.

Our special project for the upper grades during the second semester was painting with poster and textile paints. Donald Chicoine and Stanley Wilke did outstanding work in this project. Colors were mixed and combined on original designs. The textiles were used on cloth and some very nice work was completed.

At the annual fall carvival, our room had a country store, a pop corn booth and a fish pond. The material for our painting project was purchased with our share of the profits.

Fifteen pupils have written the required drills in an effort to obtain penmanship awards. These were sent to the Palmer Method Company. We have no returns from the company at this time.

This year thirty girls were in the home economics department, under the supervision of Miss Morris.

The Homemaking I Class, consisted of thirteen students. They spent their first week in getting acquainted with each other and cleaning up the homemaking room. In the canning unit they used the Kerr Home Canning booklet, and for laboratory work they canned tomatoes, tomato juice, and peaches. The breakfast unit consisted of the characteristics of dishes, table service, preparations of toast, beverage, and eating the right foods as body regulators. A century social conduct test was given analyzing personal characteristics. Dishtowels were hemmed and mbroideried. A sample booklet was made containing the weaves with various colors and constructions of textiles. Other subjects that were studied were personal grooming, and personality types. Simple garment construction consisted of a blouse, pajamas, or aprons.

The Homemaking II class consisted of ten students. The first weeks were spent in studying the Kerr's Home Canning booklet, after which they canned tomatoes, tomato juice, and peaches. Table setting and making out tea menus were practiced along with attractive flower arrangements. The breakfast unit was reviewed, and then they studied characteristics of the luncheon unit. This included eating of the right foods, such as food groups and body regulators. Booklets were made on silver, glassware and china. The home nursing unit included general care of the sick, food for the sick, what a good medicine chest should contain, first aid, disease and control and occupation for the sick. Textile study consisted of weaves, reports on individual fibers, and advanced clothing project such as a dress or slacks were undertaken. In the dinner unit, the characteristics of food and dishes were stressed. Handicraft work was also done.

The Homemaking III class consisted of seven juniors. They reviewed canning methods and their laboratory work consisted of canring tomatoes, tomato juice, and pineapple and peach jam. They constructed booklets to illustrate materials in home furnishing and had handicraft work which was the knitting of neck scarfs. A unit in child care consisted of diseases, play, clothing, food, habits and behavior, story telling, and a party was given for the children. In hone nursing the general care of the sick, medicine chest, disease and control, and occupation for the sick were stressed. The juniors big event of the year was the planning and giving of a mother's tea at Christmas time, for this and exhibit of canned goods and booklets was displayed.

This year an Industrial-ArtsCourse was offered to the freshmenand sophomores as well as to the boys of the upper classes. There were about thirty-three students enrolled for this subject. This large number was divided into four divisions. Each division was given one class period a day and they worked in their spare time.

The first semester a unit workbook was given to all the boys -The book, "Hand Woodworking" by Douglas-Roberts, gave the boyssome helpful information on the classification of wood, its uses, the refinishing of wood and the correct usage of tools. The boys proved to be very skillful and turned out various projects such as book ends, flower pots, mint and nut bowls with hammer, serving trays, endtable, coffee tables, powder boxes, a cedar chest, a boat, a water scooter, a table lamp, table leaf and a toboggan. The second semester was devoted to project making, with a lot of outside work that helped a good deal around the school. Some of the boys painted the gym floor. Others helped build and put up new scenaery for the dramatic department. Other students were busy doing odd jobs for some of the instructors.

Many new tools were purchased for shop which were appreciated very much by the boys. Some of the equipment they had to work with this year is listed as follows: Rip saw, crosscut coping key hole saw, ball pien hammers, claw hammers, wood chisels, lyth chisels, framing squares, try squares, wood planes, brace and bit nail sets, three screw drivers, and press drills.

Woods such as; walnut, bean wood, cedar, pine, oak, fur and hackberry helped to turn out some very successful projects.

Some of the finishing products that turned out the most successfurl are as follows: Light Mahogany, Dark Mahogany, Light Walnut Dark Walnut, Light Oak, Dark Oak, Shellac, Natural Varnish and enamel paints. Various grades of sand paper were used to smooth the woodwork down for the finishing materials. For highschool level, some very difficult and outstanding work was done.

The students at Jefferson High School were very lucky to have Mr . Charles House, the shop instructor, for the year 1947-48. He has had much back ground and practical experience in this line of work. Mr. House received his training at Southern State Teachers College at Springfield, South Dakota, with a major in industrial Arts and minor in Math and English. He received a great deal of experience from his father who has a cabinet shop. Mr. House has not made definite plans for the future yet, though he may continue teaching and later branch into electricity which seems to be great interest to him.

The glee club was composed of twenty-five girls. After several weeks of working on breathing exercises and vocalizing, they made their first public appearance between the acts of the junior class play. The two numbers sung by the glee club were "Were You There", (acapella) Author unknown, and "America the Beautiful" with a soprano obligato. A trio, made up of Cleo Barkley, first soprano; Lois Landers, second soprano; andDcis Bergstrom, alto, sang "Oh, Dear, What Can the Matter Be", and "Pic-a-Nic-in".

For the girls second appearance they performed at the Mothers Tea held in the Home Economics room. The numbers sung by the glee club were "This is My Country," and "Rose Marie".
