Mr. Leon Swier: Mr. Swier felt that 95% of the high school students have a good attitude about education and our American society in general. 

Mr. Knutson would like to train the students so they can acquire a trade which is useful for post-high school jobs.







Mr. Mick O'Connell was our math teacher and he strived to get this objective in all his classes: pre-college preparation and general exposure to non-college oriented students. This year we had a guest speaker, John Notheis, a college professor of math from Yankton College. (See senior math for more details) The general math class was busy learning the language of Algebra, and the "Changing Times Mini-Program" which included budgeting, savings, renting and buying.



Senior math, a 4th year math class, was taught by Mr. Leon Swier. In his class he tried to help the students appreciate the need for precision in mathematics. Mr. John Notheis also visited our school and had a presentation of the fourth dimension. He encouraged math students to seek an explanation of the fourth dimension, if possible. He also related mathematic's role of importance to outer space and phenomenon mysteries of the world.





Mr. Keith Kuchenbecker was the instructor of the vocational agriculture program. His lesson plans included the study of cattle, grains, poultry, dairy, swine, sheep, horses, meats, etc. He also taught shop which included shop procedure, a safety course, tools and identification, carpentry, and beginning welding.

Ag I also had a course of FFA and parliamentary procedure. They too, participated in many judging contests, district and state, throughout the school year.

Art I was generally a basic art course which acquainted students with color. design, balance and various aspects of art such as sculpture, drawing, commercial design, printing and art history. Art Il students worked independently, choosing their own course of study. Projects ranged from paintings on the wall to poster size portraits of all the seniors for graduation.



In biology the students were busy with such activities as medical self-help, preparing scrapbooks after field trips, class room sessions, labs, disecting.




### The Bold Ones






## All in the Family



Do you think the system used for getting on HSH is a good one? Yes, replied 57%, 21% of those polled said no, and 22% did not answer.


