FOREWORD



The 1955 Elk will try to help you relive the past year and enable you to recall, we hope with nostalgia, familiar scenes and faces of Elk Point High School.






On March 14 we were very much saddened to be informed of the death of our Superintendent, Mr. Williams.


DECLAM








FRESHMAN FLOAT








Once again, the Elk Point gridders, in winning the Big Seven Conference Championship, displayed the hard, clean football for which Pointer teams are becoming noted.


A highlight of the conference season was the Canton game in which a determined Pointer eleven completely dominated a contest which always means the conference crown.


Through the season Elk Point scored 218 points to 56 for their opponents and placed five men on the all-conference team.


